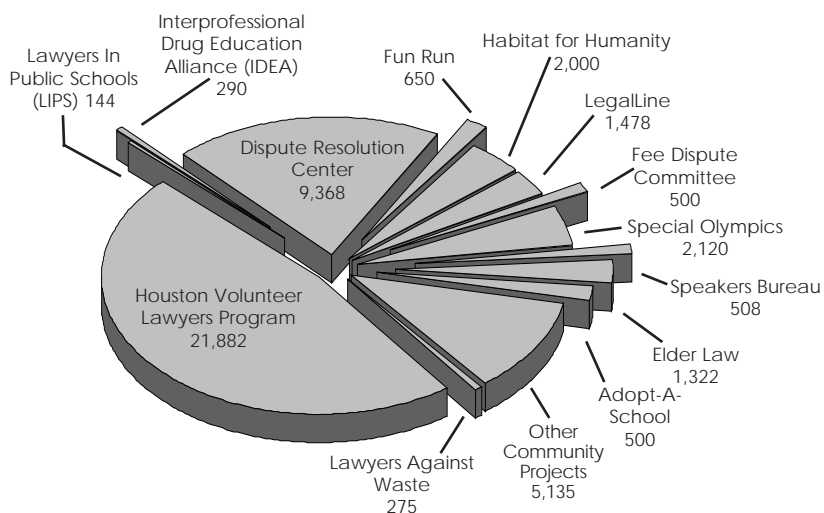
adheres to those basic principles, but has expanded its goals to include public service and better access to legal services for all citizens in the Greater Houston area.

Did You Know?

- Membership in the Houston Bar Association is voluntary. An attorney does not have to join the HBA to practice law in Texas.
- The Houston Bar Association is an information and resource service for its members and the public. If you have a question about legal services or the administration of justice, we will try to answer your questions or direct your call to someone who can provide the answers you need.
- While the Houston Bar Association has no attorneys on staff and cannot give legal advice, we may be able to refer you to an appropriate program for help.
- The Supreme Court of Texas licenses attorneys and the State Bar of Texas, through the Commission on Lawyer Discipline, governs attorneys, including investigating complaints and handling discipline. Legal Services

AIDS Outreach Program

The AIDS Outreach Committee assists the Houston Volunteer Lawyers Program in providing legal services, assistance and education for persons with HIV/AIDS, caregivers and health professionals. For information, call (713) 759-1133.

Dispute Resolution Center

When problems threaten to become lawsuits, the Dispute Resolution Center offers citizens a free alternative to legal action. Services include community-based mediation, court-ordered mediation, arbitration, and moderated settlement conferences. Trained mediators and moderators bring together persons on both sides of an argument and help them reach an agreement before the problem leads to a costly lawsuit or violence. If you have a problem or lawsuit, you may be able to resolve it through the DRC. For more information, call (713) 755-8274.

Elder Law Program

Senior citizens have unique legal needs. Attorneys visit senior centers to provide legal advice on a bi-monthly basis. An annual Will-A-Thon provides no-cost wills and medical directives to low-income seniors to assist them with estate planning. Houston Lawyer Referral Service

Houston Lawyer Referral Service can recommend a competent attorney who will set up an initial consultation for a reduced fee. Citizens can then decide if they would like to continue the services of that attorney at the attorney's regular fee scale. For income eligible citizens, HLRS has a panel of attorneys who agree to handle cases on a reduced fee scale. HLRS maintains a large panel of attorneys who handle all types of cases. Houston Volunteer Lawyers Program

Houston attorneys volunteer their time to provide legal services in civil matters for Houston's needy citizens. This program helps those who cannot get help through other legal aid programs and is based on income eligibility. Special units within the Houston Volunteer Lawyers Program handle family law, AIDS, problems of the elderly, low-income tax matters, and veterans' issues. HVLP also sponsors monthly legal advice clinics. To reach the program, call (713) 228-0732.

Legal Handbooks

The HBA offers free handbooks in English, Spanish, Korean, Vietnamese and Mandarin Chinese that answer questions on elder law, family law, and consumer law. LegalLine

Many times, citizens need answers to legal questions or simple legal advice that can be given over the telephone in just a few moments. Or, citizens may need a referral to other legal or social service agencies. On the first and third Wednesday of each month, from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m., volunteer attorneys answer telephone calls from the public. On the first Thursday of each month, the Mexican-American Bar Association and the Hispanic Bar Association answer Spanish calls during *Consejos Legales*, from 6-8 p.m. On the third Tuesday of each month, the Asian legal community answers legal questions for the Vietnamese speaking community, from 5-7 p.m. The LegalLine number is (713) 759-1133.

Veterans' Legal Clinics

Volunteer attorneys provide advice and counsel to veterans at a Veterans' Legal Advice Clinic held every Friday afternoon from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. at the Michael E. DeBakey VA Medical Center. Legal advice clinics also are held at some residential facilities for veterans. If veterans need further legal assistance, they may be referred to a pro bono attorney through the Houston Volunteer Lawyers Program. For more information call (713) 228-0732.

Adopt-A-School

The HBA is a partner with B.C. Elmore Middle School in the North Forest Independent School District. The HBA provides volunteers for tutoring, mentoring, and campus beautification, as well as donating books, school supplies and other learning tools. Cell Phone Donation Program

Since 2000, HBA members have donated their used cell phones and battery chargers to benefit residents of local women's shelters and women in potentially violent situations. According to FCC regulations, all fully-charged cell phones must be able to reach the 911 emergency system, even without cellular service. Phones are either donated directly to shelters or cycled through a cellular company's program that refurbishes and sells the phones to raise money for shelters and projects that provide women with access to emergency assistance. Children's Art Exhibits

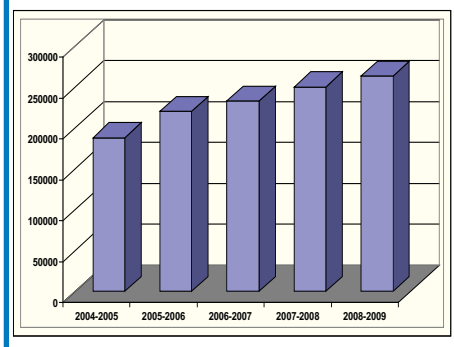

IDEA Program

The Interprofessional Drug Education Alliance (IDEA) is a partnership between the HBA and the medical community. Teams of a lawyer and a doctor visit local schools each fall and spring to educate 5th graders on both the legal and medical consequences of substance abuse. Judicial Polls

Believing that an informed electorate is vital to the efficient administration of justice, the HBA asks its members to respond to three polls concerning the judiciary. In election years, a candidate qualification poll is distributed before the primary, followed by a preference poll before the general election. In non-election years, a judicial evaluation poll gives HBA members the opportunity to evaluate the performance of judges based on various criteria. Juvenile Consequences Partnership

Juvenile Justice Mock Trial Program

This program has reached over 35,000 students in its 35 years of service, giving them the

opportunity to learn about and participate in the judicial process. Working with school districts throughout the area, HBA staff and law students help young teens prepare a "mock trial," assuming the roles of judge, jurors, attorneys, defendants, witnesses, and other court personnel. Then, with the help of the Harris County judges, the students re-enact their trial in an actual Harris County Courtroom, with parents invited as spectators.
